BERNIE AUGUSTE

Bernie heads the security team for Openreach which comprises 16 people who provide the strategy and also implement security for a part of BT which has 33,000 people, with regulated assets of around £11 billion and revenues of more than £5 billion. Openreach looks after the 'first mile' of the network, from the exchange through to homes and businesses. Since joining BT in 1972 Bernie has had various roles within Property construction/ refurbishment and Facilities management. He was also Head of Group Physical Security and Crisis management planning / exercising for the BT Board together with Executive protection. Bernie became the Head of Security for Physical, IT and Information Assurance security on moving to Openreach, which was created in January 2006 as a heavily regulated business.

A key part of Bernie's role is protection of the BT access network infrastructure spanning the UK both above and below ground. With a small security team his primary aim is to get the business engaged in the security agenda, supporting plans and programmes and taking security seriously.

PAUL FENTON

Paul joined Southern Water in March 1990 after an eighteen-year career as a Naval Officer, serving in the Royal Navy and latterly in the Royal Navy of Oman. Initially working in the company's Operational Control Centre, Paul moved on to work in the Health & Safety department before taking up the role of Emergency & Security Manager in June 1998. He was appointed Corporate Resilience Manager in July 2005, with a brief to ensure that Southern Water has plans to cover Business Continuity, Regional and National emergencies, and meets its obligations under the Civil Contingencies Act.

Paul, a former Chair of the Water (UK) Emergency and Security Group, is the current Chair of the Water (UK) Security Standards Sub-Group and is also the Chair of the DEFRA CBRN Working Group. He also sits on the Co-operation and Information Sharing group advising the Civil Contingencies Secretariat.

Paul's hobbies are fishing on the rivers Test and Itchen and foreign travel. He is currently mourning the demise of Southampton FC.

GUS KENNEDY

Gus is the lead adviser to the UK's Electricity Supply Industry within the energy team at CPNI and has, over the last few years, worked with the industry and the responsible government departments and regulator to identify and protect critical elements of the transmission and distribution networks. This work has developed into a long term project with an anticipated budget in excess of £200m.

Gus has, for the past twenty years, had a varied and challenging career in the world of counter terrorism. Prior to joining CPNI he worked for the Metropolitan Police and was engaged in the protection of London's diplomatic community, working with the retail and commercial sectors and at a strategic level the development of police policy and procedures in response to the terrorist threat. He has been engaged with the electricity industry in various capacities since the 1996 terrorist plot to disrupt the supply into London.
